The flowers are white or pink.

The edible berries are black and sweet. Watch out for the very sharp prickles on the stems.

This evergreen shrub may have stems 30 feet long.

The red to greenish-red berries are edible raw but tend to loosen the bowels. Cooking them renders them more palatable and greatly reduces the purgative.

Site: Moist woods and streambanks to rocky, well-drained, often fully exposed side-hills.



This is a very common plant and it often carpets large areas with bright, tiny, pink flowers.

The deeply cleft, fern-like leaves and deep roots have a strong pungent smell.

The long, narrow. pointed Heron/Stork/Crane's bill -shaped seed pods give rise to the genus name Erodios from the Greek for Heron.

Range: Semi-desert, foothills, meadows, openings, shrub-lands, and lawns
