Improving Troutdale as a Place to Live, Work and Visit

- The City Council chose to begin a program to enhance community livability through a funding source that Metro provides communities that have solid waste transfer stations, including Troutdale. The Community Enhancement Fund will provide \$60,000-\$80,000 each year to Troutdale, which a governance board will distribute.
- The City began an Adopt-A-Park program which encourages citizens and volunteer groups to help with parks maintenance and improvements.
- The Parks Department knows two bridges in Beaver Creek need to be replaced; one was removed for safety issues, and another was damaged from the recent high water event in early December and will be repaired.
- 2,900 persons participated in our recreation classes, camps and programs.
- Troutdale will be joining others to celebrate the 100-year Anniversary of the building of the Historic Columbia River Highway in 2016. "Milepost 1" is in Troutdale.
- Grayline Tours is planning a new Columbia Gorge tour that will start in downtown Portland and stop to pick people up in Troutdale four times daily in the summer of 2016. (Continued on Page 2)

Eastwinds to Purchase and Develop Urban Renewal Area

On February 16, 2016 the City Council and Urban Renewal Agency authorized a binding "Letter of Intent" agreement with Eastwinds Development LLC for Eastwinds to purchase the 12-acre site once used as the City's wastewater treatment plant property, under various conditions, whose key terms are summarized as follows:

Eastwinds will purchase the City's portion of the Urban Renewal Area (URA) in its current condition for a price of \$1,500,000, and the City will use its best efforts to condemn the new roadway through the Columbia Gorge Outlet Mall to create a new public street at the public's expense. If condemnation of that roadway proves unfeasible, then instead of Eastwinds purchasing the City's 12-acre property, the City will purchase Eastwinds' 8-acre property in its current condition for a price of approximately \$2,100,000.

The agreement contains several other provisions including the understanding that the City will engage a person or contractor, reasonably acceptable to

Eastwinds, to be the lead executive for the URA and who will be supervised directly by the URA Board, to represent and coordinate the URA's efforts to realize the adopted URA plan, including amendments to that plan as the URA Board finds necessary, subject to legal procedures for amending the URA Plan should it be necessary.

This agreement solidifies the partnership between Eastwinds LLC and the City regarding these issues, which are crucial to consolidating ownership and providing access to entice a hotel and conference operator to develop the property as the URA plan envisions and Eastwinds believes is economically feasible. In addition, both the URA and Eastwinds support the URA vision of developing a multi-use pathway along the shoreline, which will enhance the public's access to the Sandy River.

Economic Development Partnerships

- The City is actively engaged in a multi-pronged effort to enhance Troutdale's reputation as an arts-oriented destination. Particularly noteworthy is the City's financial support for an outstanding display at the Barn Museum by the Troutdale Historical Society of the Historic Columbia River Highway in time for its centennial celebration this summer, along with the new "Visionary Park", that will include a landmark sculpture by local artist Rip Caswell recognizing the designers and builders of the Historic Columbia River Highway.
- Through a multi-agency partnership of cities in the Columbia River Gorge and the State Department of Transportation, Troutdale and the West Columbia Gorge Chamber of Commerce is enhancing our reputation for bicycle tourism by designing a landmark "Hub" at Depot Park for bicyclists and pedestrians.
- The City sponsored and supported the annual SummerFest and Tree Lighting events, managed by the Chamber of Commerce, that celebrate pride in our City. Other notable events the City supports include the Fall Festival of the Arts, car shows, half-marathons, and pancake feeds.
- The City facilitated a plan with the support of the West Columbia Gorge Chamber of Commerce and the Troutdale Historical Society that will, once completed, both preserve a train museum in the historic Depot at Depot Park and provide a new home for the Visitors Center.
- The Troutdale Market Center got a nice facelift and renovation by the Yoshida Group. One main occupant is the Multisensory Learning Academy (MLA) Middle School, with 180 students now and up to 330 in the future.
- Calcagno Cellars is remodeling a building in downtown Troutdale to turn it into a nice winery.

Growing Carefully

- New commercial development was valued at about \$7,703,000 last year. Construction of new single family homes last year were valued at \$721,500 and new multifamily homes added \$750,000 in value, for a residential total of \$1,471,500.
- Interest continues in industrial development in and around the Troutdale Reynolds Industrial Park (TRIP).
- The Port of Portland commenced construction of Phases II and III of TRIP in 2015. The project will include nine additional industrial lots for development, associated utility and transportation infrastructure, improvements to the entirety of NW Graham Road, and a tremendous amount of natural resource restoration and mitigation.
- FedEx postponed their 155,598 square-foot expansion, that is valued at \$20 million, which is expected to occur this year.
- The Port of Portland led a public effort over the last year to revise the long-term 20-year plan for the Troutdale Airport. An advisory committee came up with a preferred option of adding additional industrial building sites on the north side of the airport, moving the aviation facilities to the south side, and shortening the runway from 5,400 feet to 4,500 feet long. The process is continuing.
- The Discovery Block development is progressing this year, adding 5-10 townhomes to our downtown.
- A plan to construct a gas-powered electrical generating plant in Troutdale has petered out. That will be good news to some, but it will make the "optimistic" scenario in our budget forecast less hopeful.
- City staff and the Planning Commission continue to seek ways to improve and streamline Troutdale Development Code and hope to have the revisions complete and considered in the spring.
- We increased our population slightly to 16,020.

Urban Renewal Area Progresses!

- The development agreement between the City and Eastwinds is finally in place. A binding Letter of Intent for purchase and sale of real estate was approved by the City Council on February 16, 2016.
- Eastwinds LLC completed the cleanup of the "sheep pit" contamination on their property, using loans from the U.S. Environment Protection Agency and Business Oregon.
- The City's main responsibility now will be to gain access for a new public road through the middle of the Columbia Gorge Outlet stores, to provide the main access to the urban renewal area.



- Eastwinds Concept Plan for development of the urban renewal area includes:
 - A 100-150 bed hotel (Hyatt-style) with destination spa
 - Medium sized convention center, able to accommodate 500-1,000 people
 - Retail shops (retail to complement existing outlet mall)
 - Riverside trail (Sandy River), bike path and park
 - Outdoor grassy area for concerts in summer
 - Water Tower coffee shop

City Hall Options Debated

- A workplan to engage the community in defining our long-term needs and the best location for a new or restored City Hall was developed, including proposals both to sell the former City Hall and to restore the building to remain a City Hall. Whether to do either will be considered in the process just noted in 2016.



Public Safety Enhanced

- Troutdale had 1,394 fire and emergency medical services calls, an increase of 394 calls from 2014 (40%).
- Troutdale, Fairview and Wood Village collectively renewed the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) for Fire and Emergency Services with the City of Gresham. This contract will expire in July 2025 if not renewed or replaced.
- We implemented a strong, balanced IGA agreement with the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) to both improve our police services in Troutdale, and save the City money at the same time. The effective date was July 1, 2015.
- The Council recently voted to use \$175,000 of the lease payment from MCSO for use of our police building—to pay down the building Bond—thus lowering residents' property tax bill in November.
- In addition to providing safety for students, staff and the community at Reynolds High School, the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the Reynolds School District, has enhanced our School Resource Officer (SRO)/Community Policing Team with one additional SRO at Walt Morey Middle School, and assigned a sergeant to supervise and develop the overall SRO program.
- During this past 2015 holiday season, over 180 barrels of toys were collected at the Christmas Toy Drive in a team effort with the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and The Troutdale Public Safety Advisory Committee. As a result, hundreds of toys were delivered to East County families by SnowCap.
- American Medical Response continues to pay for and provide lifeguards on the Sandy River during the summer. This successful life-saving program has been in place since 1999.

Infrastructure Improved

- The Public Works Department efficiently and safely operated and maintained our water, sanitary sewer, storm drainage and local street systems.
- The Water Department provided 595 million gallons of clean, safe drinking water to over 4,300 customers.
- The Water Department was recognized by the State of Oregon Drinking Water Program as an "Outstanding Performer".
- The City collected and treated 485 million gallons of wastewater at the Water Pollution Control Facility and maintained over 55 miles of wastewater collection pipes, and 10 pump stations.



- Public Works completed another large pavement preservation project, which treated approximately 1/3 of the City's streets. The city's Street Department maintains and manages over 43 miles of paved roadways.
- Public Works negotiated an agreement with PGE for a project to convert overhead utilities to underground along Troutdale Road from Cherry Park Road to Beaver Creek and will commence in 2016.
- The voters of Troutdale approved a new 3-cent per gallon local gas tax, phased in over three years, which will provide much-needed funding to preserve and maintain the City's street network.

You must know the FAA rules and guidelines before you fly your drone!

There has been a lot of recent interest involving the recreational use of small unmanned aircraft (drones) being flown in our community. The term "drone" refers to a variety of flying devices that are controlled with onboard computers or remotely with a handheld remote, computer or smartphone. Your new boomerang or GoPro is not a drone. Your radio controlled quadcopter is.

According to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) website, "unmanned aircraft systems (UAS), drones can be small toys or a large industrial unmanned aircraft". Consumer drones are enjoyed as a technological toy flown by children, by flying hobbyists, for photography and cinematography. Additionally,

there appears to be a growing market for the use of drones for commercial use such as high-quality mapping, inspections of wind turbines and railroads as well as use for improving agricultural production by assessing effectiveness of pesticides and drainage areas. Some public safety uses may include the search and rescue of injured/lost persons in wilderness areas and damage assessment during and after environmental emergencies such as wildfires and earthquakes.

Drone enthusiasts are essentially aviators where there is needed skill and high level of responsibility for safe use. The FAA has established guidelines for registration of drones regarding the size, weight and use.

PRE-FLIGHT CHECKLIST

All drones are aircraft – even the ones at the toy store. So when you fly a drone, you are a pilot. Before you fly, always go through the pre-flight checklist at right, and regularly check the safety guidelines at faa.gov/uas

-  I fly below 400 feet
-  I always fly within visual line of sight
-  I'm aware of FAA airspace requirements: go to faa.gov/go/uastfr
-  I never fly over groups of people
-  I never fly over stadiums and sports events
-  I never fly within 5 miles of an airport without first contacting air traffic control and airport authorities
-  I never fly near emergency response efforts such as fires
-  I never fly near other aircraft
-  I never fly under the influence

Are you interested in what your City Council is talking about during their meetings? Here you will find a listing of all Council meetings for the last three years, with the most current meeting listed at the top. The "Agenda" column provides you with agendas for the meetings and lists a brief summary of all the items to be addressed at the meeting. Click on the "Packet" column to get detailed information about each individual agenda item, and frequently includes the text of a presentation on an agenda. Another great feature is the "Audio/Video" column which allows you to listen to the audio and/or watch the video from past meetings.

This same procedure can be used to obtain additional information for any of the City Committees including: Budget Committee, Planning Commission, Citizens Advisory Committee, Parks Advisory Committee, Historic Landmarks Commission, and Public Safety Advisory Committee.

Troutdale Recreation Now Online Only for Registration

Effective April 6, 2016, the City will no longer accept paper registration forms when registering for recreation programs. The only option is to register online.

The reason for the change is to create a system in which registration is entered in the order received. Currently there is a lag time with paper registrations which has resulted in overbooking classes. We want to ensure that every registrant is guaranteed a spot in the class once they pay the registration fee.

Some East Troutdale Residents to Get Tax Relief

For some time, property owners in the territory within District 14 have objected to what they perceive as duplicate taxes for fire and ambulance services. Until 2013 the legislature had not allowed the City to withdraw from the District 14 territory, which the City Council subsequently authorized on March 15, 2016. As a consequence, property owners within our City limits east of the Sandy River should see a decrease in their property tax bill this Fall. The mutual aid agreement between District 14 and City of Gresham Fire and Emergency Services will preserve the existing emergency capabilities that both District 14 and Gresham currently provide.

Bulky Waste Event - Curbside Pickup

When: Wednesday, May 4, prior to 6 a.m.

Where: At YOUR curb

What to know: This year's annual bulky waste event will be **AT THE CURB** on Wednesday, May 4th. What does that mean? Instead of hauling your bulky waste to another location, you can simply set out a variety of bulky items at the curb for FREE pick-up as part of our Spring Cleanup event! Here's what to do:

- Place items at the curb next to your regular garbage can by 6 a.m. on Wednesday, May 4th
- The **volume placed at the curb should be roughly equivalent to five garbage cans or less** – in addition to (not including) your regular garbage container.
- Smaller items can be placed in your garbage can if the weight of the can is no more than 60 pounds.

Accepted bulky items include: Bicycles, mattresses, BBQs, appliances, carpet, scrap metal, tires, plumbing fixtures, windows, furniture, lawn mowers.

Not accepted at the curb: Paint, hazardous materials, liquids, propane tanks, car batteries, dirt, sod and stumps, rock, concrete, and industrial and commercial waste.
