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A Mural at Mayors Square

A new "historic themed" mural added to our public art!

On September 28, 2016, Troutdale Historical Society (THS) President Sharon Nesbit dedicated the new Mayors Square mural. The mural was created by artists Dwayne Harty and Tammy Callens of Victor, Idaho.

The couple, working from historic photos provided by the Troutdale Historical Society, recreated a scene from a century ago along our Historic Columbia River Highway when Troutdale had a one-sided main street. Troutdale chiropractor Dr. Frank Card graciously agreed to "host" the mural on the side of his building directly adjacent to Mayor's Square.

"Dwayne Harty worked hard to make sure the scene was accurate. Some of the local residents in the mural are Clara Larsson, first woman mayor of Troutdale, and Aaron Fox, first mayor. Working from images from the society's photo collection, Dwayne and Tammy included various children from Troutdale families which we leave to their families to figure out," Nesbit said.

The Mayors Square Mural will kick start a comprehensive public art program that will enhance Troutdale's tourist-industry. The mural depicts a historic scene of Troutdale located in the commercial district and a popular city park, and will benefit not only Troutdale residents and business owners, but also the countless tourists passing through the Gateway to the Gorge.

This mural is the first project of the THS Troutdale Arts Council whose mission is to provide public art in the community and to promote awareness of arts and local culture.

The project was led by Arts Council member and renowned local sculptor Rip Caswell, along with other THS volunteers. The THS sponsored the project and provided grant-matching volunteer time. Funds were provided by the new

Our Vote on Imagination Station

Many people have wondered how the Parks Advisory Committee (PAC) arrived at its recommendation to City Council about what to do at Imagination Station. When Council requested that recommendation, a PAC subcommittee set to work with the Parks Superintendent. Two open house public meetings were publicized, and design day meetings were held at Sweetbriar and Troutdale elementary schools to

hear from Troutdale's children. The open house meetings were poorly attended, but the school kids had lots of ideas. The PAC subcommittee reviewed proposals for Imagination Station from three well-known construction firms.

We knew that many folks hoped for all-wood structures in rebuilding Imagination Station. We were told that such structures would have to be replaced every 20-30 years, and that the remaining portion of Imagination Station had an estimated 5-10 years of life left. *(See "Imagination," Page 2)*


Make a Difference in Your Community by Volunteering for a City Committee

advise Council not to use wood, but materials that would last longer and hold up better. The PAC favored the draft proposal from a firm with much experience with parks in the Northwest. They use powder-coated galvanized steel, which does not get hot in the sun and resists graffiti. Their fully ADA-compliant play systems have a guaranteed life of 50+ years, can be designed to look any way we want, and can even have a look of wood. They provide the highest product liability coverage in the industry. They also offer grants to lessen costs and use U.S. Communities, the same national purchasing firm that the City of Troutdale uses, to hold down costs. Their products are fully made in America. Their construction process does not require an on-site contractor, skilled labor, or power equipment for assembly, different from the other firms we looked at. Their proposal was also hundreds of thousands of dollars less than those of other firms. On July 12 we advised Council to use this firm to rebuild Imagination Station completely, from coated steel. On August 9, Council voted to rebuild all of the structure but did not decide on a firm or materials.



All the proposals PAC vetted require much volunteer involvement. A number of local companies have offered substantial donations of labor and materials, and many citizens have signed up to help when the time comes. We look for exciting things to happen at Imagination Station!

Out in the Parks...with Tim Seery

Much has happened at the Parks in Troutdale since my last article. The trees are starting to change color and we're getting ready for the big fall leaf pick up. It is amazing how many leaves can accumulate here in Troutdale!

Now is the time to set up an area for composting your leaves and other trimmings. A mulch pile provides a great environment for the growth of microbes and the rich nutrients they leave behind. Mulch can then be added back into your flower beds and gardens to help develop a very rich soil chemistry, reducing the need to apply chemical fertilizers, saving you money and benefitting the environment.

The City is drafting a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the Imagination Station rebuild.

The request will give the City the maximum discretion possible when choosing a replacement structure. The Parks Advisory Committee will review the draft RFP and make a recommendation to Council for final approval. In addition, the Parks Advisory Committee is discussing if and when to hold a Town Hall meeting for public input on an off-leash dog park.

The 1st Annual Fall Planting Event at Sunrise Park was a big success, with approximately 170 potted shrubs planted in the park (see photo, left). The weather was cooperative and approximately 22 people came out to help plant. A big "Thank You!" to all the volunteers who made this event possible.

Which Streets Will Be Plowed First?

Yep, it's all fun and games until your car starts skiing through the snowso you're going to need this information.

Arterial streets are cleared first as those serve the greatest number of users and are the most critical to mobility: 257th, Troutdale/Buxton, Stark, Cherry Park, Halsey, and Columbia River Highway. (City crews deploy to the County's arterial roads if the County's forces are occupied elsewhere)

Emergency Response and Public Facilities are cleared next, such as the Police Station, Fire Station, City Hall, and schools.

Collector streets, which provide connections to local streets come next. Among the collector streets are Beaver Creek Lane, Chapman Avenue, Corbeth Lane, Evans Avenue, Lewellyn Avenue, and Sweetbriar Lane.

Local streets are near the bottom of the priority list and, in most cases, warming temperatures and/or rain will remove the snow or ice before snow removal crews can get there.

YOU can help the whole process of snow removal go more quickly, allowing us to get you on your way faster, if you will assist us by parking out of the roadway so our snowplows can maneuver through narrow city streets, and by keeping sidewalks adjacent to your property cleared. Also, please drive only if it's absolutely critical right after a snow event. If driving is unavoidable, exercise caution, using traction devices whenever necessary.

When Leaves Fall

It's fall and those pesky leaves are falling again, clogging up the storm drain on your street. You have several options. Number one, you could try super gluing the leaves back onto the branches, but that's way too much work. Or, you could employ the strategy of an old friend of mine, sending his young sons up into the branches to hand pluck all the leaves and stuff them into trash bags. Or, you could just let them fall, and then rake them off the storm drain as they accumulate. Yep. That's the one.

Employing strategy number three does come with some ground rules. First, please remember that Troutdale doesn't have a leaf pick up program, so the leaves have to go into your compost pile or your yard debris can. Secondly, you have to employ the correct tools. A sturdy rake will probably do, but a really sopping wet heavy



pile right on top of the drain may require a pitchfork or shovel. Thirdly, don't stuff the leaves down into the drain, that'll cause a real doozy of a problem when it rains. And finally, remember that the stuff that goes down those drains can end up in the water supply, so make sure nothing you'd rather not drink gets in there.

Well, that pretty much sums it up I guess, so get out there and rake off those storm drains! Unless you decided on option one. Hope you're done gluing by next spring...

Build Your Survival Kit in 24 Weeks

Being “prepared” means being equipped with the proper supplies you may need in the event of an emergency or disaster. But for many, the cost of being prepared is so overwhelming that the kit isn’t completed due to the expense. Here, the American Red Cross has spread out your supply kit over a 24-week period. We will cover 12 weeks in this issue and 12 in the next. Spread it out further if you like by turning the first twelve weeks into 24 – or complete it earlier!

A garbage can-style plastic receptacle with rollers is ideal for holding your supplies and is easily moveable in case you need to evacuate. For food and water, the rule of thumb is this: **Water** - one gallon per person, per day (three-day supply for evacuation, two-week supply for home); **Food** - non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (three-day supply for evacuation, two-week supply for home). **NOTE: The following list allows for enough food for a three-day period, but many experts suggest you build a two-week supply. Adjust amounts according to your preference.**

WEEK 1:

- 1 gallon water*
- 1 can ready-to-eat meat (tuna, chicken, etc.)*
- 1 hand-operated can opener
- Large receptacle with rollers to hold supplies

TO DO: Learn about the emergencies that could happen where you live and the right way to respond to them.

WEEK 2:

- 1 large bag of dried fruit or trail mix
- 2 flashlights with batteries
- Permanent marking pen such as a Sharpie

TO DO: Make sure emergency contact numbers are easy to identify in mobile devices: ICE + contact number (ICE = ‘In Case of Emergency’).

WEEK 3

- A complete First Aid Kit
- Hand sanitizer and hand soap
- Local map – hard copy

TO DO: Date items in your kit as you go (food, water, batteries, etc.).

WEEK 4:

- Battery/hand-crank emergency radio
- Compass
- Waterproof matches

TO DO: Install a carbon monoxide (CO) detector and smoke alarm.

WEEK 5:

- 1 gallon water*
- 1 can ready-to-eat meat (tuna, chicken, etc.)*
- Large box of energy bars

TO DO: Identify family meet-up locations. Identify one person out of the area you can use as a contact person in case you lose touch with members of your family.

WEEK 6:

- 1 large can fruit*
- Large box of crackers
- Paper plates
- Plastic forks, knives, spoons
- Playing cards and games

TO DO: Develop home evacuation plans.

WEEK 7

- 2 changes of clothing for each family member, plus jacket, sweatshirt and sturdy shoes.
- Pain reliever
- Thermometer
- Utensils for food preparation, including spatula, large spoon, knives

TO DO: Practice home evacuation plans.

WEEK 8:

- Whistle - metal is better than plastic
- Extra bulbs and batteries for flashlights
- Fire extinguisher
- Pry bar
- Utility knife

TO DO: Locate and identify utility shutoffs.

WEEK 9:

- 1 gallon water*
- 1 can soup*
- Pliers and screwdrivers - multiple sizes and formats if possible
- Hammer
- Strapping and fastening tools to secure hot-water heaters, bookcases and computer desks or tables.

TO DO: Develop an emergency network among family, friends and neighbors.

WEEK 10:

- Large can of dry nuts
- 1 large can beans*
- Rain poncho*

TO DO: Make a list of bank and credit card account numbers and companies, and insurance policy numbers – include in kit.

WEEK 11:

- Laxative, anti-diarrheal and antacids
- Rubbing alcohol
- Have cash on hand, in small denominations such as \$1 and \$5.

WEEK 12:

- Assorted plastic containers with lids for food and other storage
- Special equipment such as hearing-aid batteries, a spare cane.
- Duct tape
- Tarp or plastic sheeting

TO DO: Use camcorder to record the contents of your home for insurance purposes.

Whether it’s winter snow or ice storms, or flooding and landslides, or the dreaded “Big One” – a catastrophic earthquake – being prepared for any level of emergency will make all the difference when seconds count.

Start with Multnomah County and City of Portland (particularly if you commute there to work). Get started on your emergency supply kit here or go to the Red Cross website for help. Troutdale Community Enhancement (CE) Program. The CE Program is funded through a solid waste Community Enhancement Fee collected and remitted by Metro of \$1.00 per ton of solid waste received at the Troutdale Transfer Station facility. Metro recognizes that solid waste transfer facilities present economic, environmental, health or other impacts on local host communities. The Community Enhancement Fee is to support rehabilitation and enhancement of communities which host solid waste transfer stations which serve the entire Metro area.

Community Enhancement projects must be within City boundaries and meet one or more of several goals, some of which are to: improve the appearance or environmental quality of the community; reduce the amount or toxicity of waste; increase reuse and recycling opportunities;

result in the preservation or enhancement of wildlife, riparian zones, wetlands, forest lands and marine areas; benefit youth, seniors, low income persons or underserved populations; and enhance art and culture within the City, among other goals.

The new CE Program has funds available for qualified organizations, including homeowner associations, City advisory committees, service clubs, schools, and other community non-profit groups, for enhancement projects that will make improvements throughout the City.

If your organization has a Community Enhancement project idea, a new grant application period will occur in the spring of 2017. Watch for details in upcoming issues of The Champion.


