ARE YOU INTERESTED IN RUNNING FOR CITY COUNCIL?

These Troutdale City Council positions are up for election at the November 3, 2020 General Election:

Mayor
Council Position #2
Council Position #4
Council Position #6

Do I qualify?

If you are interested in running for Troutdale City Council, you must be a registered voter who has resided in the City of Troutdale during the six months immediately preceding the election. That would mean that you would have to be both a resident and registered voter on or before May 3, 2020.

How long is the term of office?

All positions are a 4-year term beginning January 1, 2021, through December 31, 2024.

What is the filing window to run for City Council?

The filing window to submit a completed nominating petition to the City Recorder begins on June 3, 2020, and ends no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 25, 2020.

Other important information to know

A person may be a candidate for only one office to be filled during a single election. All successful candidates are required to file an Annual Verified Statement of Economic Interest form as required by ORS 244.050.

A summary of the process is available by visiting the City’s website at www.troutdaleoregon.gov. Filing packets with all the filing forms and reference materials will be available for pick up in May. 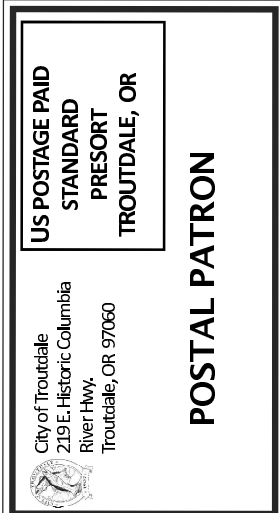

These grants are funded by a Metro imposed per-ton fee that is collected from solid-waste transfer stations and given back to communities with transfer stations within their city limits to help mitigate their impacts.

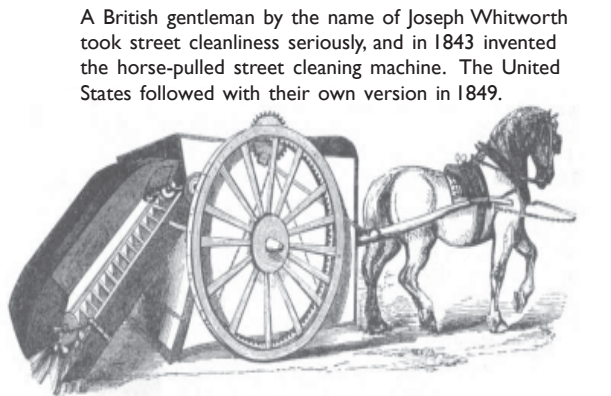
Street Trees

With all the COVID-19 quarantine restrictions, everyone has cabin fever and is getting restless! It is a great time for some spring cleaning in the front yard. Maybe some tree pruning is in order! Here’s the code language for your reference:

TMC 13.10.140 - Height and projection guidelines.
Limbs of trees may project over the sidewalk area at an elevation of not less than 7.5 feet above the sidewalk level, and over the street area at an elevation of not less than 11 feet above the street level. However, on any street designated as an arterial or one-way street, and where parking has been prohibited, limbs of trees shall be trimmed to a height of not less than 14 feet above the street level.

Move your Vehicles for the Street Sweeper

Please keep in mind that the City’s street sweeper needs clearance next to the curb in order to clean our neighborhood streets. With that in mind, **it’s the property owner’s responsibility** to trim the adjacent trees next to the street and sidewalks. It’s also helpful to move your vehicles so that they can better clean your street. Abandoned Vehicles

Vehicle parking is one of the most common complaints I receive. One of the easiest ones to fix is to ensure that you **park your vehicle on the right side of the street in the same direction as the flow of traffic**.

I do not have the ability to find out registered owners so I cannot always give warnings. I would rather not cite if I don’t have to, so please park and register your car accordingly. Below are the standards for abandoned vehicles:

TMC 10.04.020 - Abandoned vehicles.

A vehicle that has been deserted, relinquished or has one or more of the following existing conditions: The vehicle license plate or registration sticker has expired or has been canceled; the vehicle has no license plate; the vehicle has no visible vehicle identification number (VIN); the vehicle appears to be inoperative or disabled; the vehicle appears to be unlawful to operate on a public street.

Household Garbage in Parks Receptacles

It has been brought to my attention that people are placing their household garbage in various Park garbage receptacles. It has occurred more since people have stayed home to combat the COVID-19 virus.

Troutdale has a City Ordinance against taking your household garbage and putting it in City park trash receptacles. Please respect our City parks and use them as intended.

TMC 13.20.310 - Refuse and trash.

No person shall deposit, dump, place or leave rubbish, bottles, cans, garbage or refuse of any type, regardless of its source, in a city park or recreation area, **except** refuse, garbage or litter occasioned *through use of those areas* which shall be deposited in refuse receptacles provided for that purpose.

Spring Cleanup Update Extra Bag Pickup still on for May 6th

Please be aware all of the Spring Cleanup events have been cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic **with the exception of the May 6th Extra Bag Pickup** conducted by Waste Management, Inc. This is the only event scheduled to occur that is a part of the Spring Cleanup. **This means coupons for the Yard Waste Drop-Off event WILL NOT be honored by Allwood Recyclers, Inc., at this time.** For up to date information, please continue to check the city’s social media accounts and the city’s Spring Cleanup webpage. The city hopes to reschedule the remaining Spring Cleanup events at a later date when it is safe to do so according to public health guidelines.

May 6th, at your curb

What: Additional Garbage Curbside Collection

Who: Waste Management

When: Wednesday, May 6, by 6 a.m.

Where: At your curb

Waste Management will collect, at no additional cost to Troutdale community members, up to five (5) bags (**total** weight not to exceed 45 pounds per bag) of non-hazardous household and non-yard debris household garbage on the regularly scheduled Wednesday curbside pick-up. Garbage must be bagged and loose garbage will not be collected.

“Flushable” Wipes? Not really

As a result of the current COVID-19 pandemic, households and workplaces are dramatically increasing the use of both sanitizing and bathroom wipes that are often marketed as being “flushable” when they are not. There are currently no regulations requiring manufacturers to ensure that their “flushable” products actually break down properly in the sewer system. Many household cleaning products are “disposable” but should not be flushed down the toilet either. While toilet paper is designed to dissolve in the wastewater stream, clogs from these non-dissolvable wipe products including paper towels, towelettes, and mop refills can cause equipment damage, compromise the safety of wastewater treatment plant staff, potentially result in sanitary sewer backups leading to additional public health issues, and cost you, the ratepayer, money. These clogs can also occur in your own household sewer plumbing that can result in costly, damaging, and extremely unpleasant backups in your home or workplace. By staying home, staying safe, and remembering that **toilet paper belongs in the toilet and all other wipes belong in the trash**, you are doing your part to help the city fight the pandemic, protect your own household plumbing, and protect your public wastewater system.

- **Online:** Log onto www.troutdaleoregon.gov, on the homepage, click on “Online Payments & Services,” select the Water Bill or Court Fine option, and proceed
- **City Hall Outside Drop-Box:** Place bill with check, money order or cashier’s check in the drop-box to the right of the front door (no cash)
- **By Mail to:** Check, money order or cashier’s check (no cash) to Troutdale City Hall, 219 E Historic Columbia River Highway, Troutdale, OR 97060

WATER BILL ONLY

- **By Phone:** Pay with your Visa or MC debit or credit, at 1-800-720-6847 (24/7). There’s no charge, but you’ll need your account number. Court fines cannot be paid by phone.

Municipal Court Update

Following orders from Governor Kate Brown implemented in early March, the City of Troutdale made the decision to cancel and reschedule all court appearances through April 30th. The Court Clerk is available via email and phone from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Please see the information at left regarding how to make court payments. This time last year I wrote an article to help promote distracted driving awareness month. Every year thousands lose their lives to motor vehicle accidents as a result of distracted driving, and even though the distracted driving campaign was postponed due to the unprecedented health crisis, it is important for the Sheriff's Office to keep public safety a top priority. So please drive safely!

In this time of uncertainty, the Sheriff's Office wants the community to know that we remain steadfast in our commitment to public safety. While many things have changed for all of us, and police agencies across America are seeing a reduction in overall calls for service because of the shutdown to help stop the spread of the COVID-19 virus, many things remain the same for public safety. What has not changed are our concerns for crimes such as child abuse and domestic violence and the importance of efforts we take to address community livability issues such as vandalism, speeding and trespassing. What also has not changed is the fact that we continue to respond to 911 emergencies and actively patrol our community streets in order to keep the

peace, and we still need the public's help in fighting crime. The plain truth is that very little has changed about our approach to public safety except to mitigate exposure risks for our staff and the people we serve. We continue to see people speeding, and maybe even more so with fewer cars on the road. However, our deputies are still out on the streets and highways everyday enforcing traffic laws. We continue to address crime complaints and take reports of thefts, frauds and shopliftings. We are still encouraging our citizens to be our eyes and ears and report crimes and suspicious activities. Make no mistake; little has changed, and while operationally we have had to adjust to ensure the safety and health of our staff, the same number of committed deputies remain on the front line every shift to respond to emergencies and enforce the law.

As always, we will continue to work with city officials, the community and our many system partners to ensure we fully investigate crime complaints, respond effectively and efficiently to emergencies, and address safety concerns such as speeding and texting while driving, which we know are leading

causes for traffic accident-related deaths. We also want Troutdale citizens to know our deputies are completing extra patrols, business checks, premise checks and performing community-policing activities like checking the welfare of our most vulnerable populations. Like others, this crisis has required some change and for us to get creative about ways we can make a positive impact in our community. We recognize these changes and challenges have affected us all. However, we know there will be opportunities for improving the way we police our community. Your Sheriff's Office is committed to improving the

way we provide police services, and we care deeply about the City of Troutdale. Is it ok to have a garage sale?

We know the spring and summer months are popular times to hold your garage sale, but these **should be postponed** until the "Stay Home, Save Lives" order, issued by Governor Kate Brown, has been lifted. We'd rather you be safe, and put those sales off until later - the fall season would be a great time to plan for one!

Have you responded to the 2020 Census yet?

While field operations for the 2020 Census have been suspended since March due to the coronavirus pandemic, you can still complete your questionnaire either online, by phone, or by mail.

Please note that if your mailing address is a PO Box, you would not have received any Census documents via mail. But you should have received an email. If you have not yet completed your survey, please check your inbox first, then go to: <https://2020census.gov>, or call 844-330-2020 for more information.

Why complete the Census? Census results can have a big impact in your community, and the results, collected once a decade, help determine how billions of dollars in federal funding flow into states and communities each year.

Reporting abandoned grocery carts in your neighborhood

First, please remove the cart from any area where it might create a safety hazard. Then call Northwest Grocery Association Cart Retrieval Service at 1-888-552-2787. You'll speak with a live operator who guarantees pickup of the reported cart within 72 hours. Please be **very specific** in describing the location of the cart (ex., on Buxton Avenue at the NE corner of 6th & Buxton).

Our City parks remain open, but please note that **all** play structures are off-limits, and no tennis, basketball or other team sports are allowed until further notice. Remember to practice physical distancing between you and other parkgoers. Enjoy!

Given our current situation dealing with the Coronavirus, it has given me a moment to write about a topic I have been wanting to tell you about. I am pleased to announce that City staff are currently taking steps to bring the very popular game of Pickleball to our Troutdale residents. If variety is the spice of life, then this game fits the bill nicely.

For those of you unfamiliar with the game, Pickleball is a game played with two to four players on a court similar to a tennis court but slightly smaller. Players use a paddle slightly larger than a ping pong paddle and a perforated polymer ball. Currently, at Lewellyn Park, we have one-half of a tennis court taped off for a pickleball court—so if you have a portable net and paddle, you can play.

Because of the growing popularity of this sport, City staff is proposing to permanently re-mark one of the tennis courts at Lewellyn Park into two pickleball courts. This will

(Rescheduled) THS Annual Meeting & Program Fires of Troutdale. Sponsored by the Troutdale Historical Society

For most of its life, Troutdale's urban renewal came in the aftermath of fire. Flames twice ravaged the town, leaving the city to rebuild and improve. One result is the "the concrete block," where home and business owners resolved to rebuild with material that would not burn. Historian Sharon Nesbit will talk about fires in Troutdale and how they changed the city.
