More Changes under Consideration at Buxton and Historic Columbia River Highway

In an effort to improve traffic flow and reduce traffic queues at the intersection of South Buxton Road and Historic Columbia River Hwy (HCRH), Multnomah County collaborated with the City to evaluate potential short-term traffic control improvements at that intersection, ultimately installing improved striping and a new right turn only lane from eastbound HCRH to Buxton southbound last fall. While not a silver bullet for the chronic lengthy queues and delays on Buxton, these improvements did seem to reduce their severity. However, other

potential safety concerns have been observed with this configuration, so the City and County are revisiting the issue.

To improve safety at the intersection, the City and County are considering the institution of an all-way stop control, with the exception of the eastbound right-turn lane that would remain a free right turn. The County staff plans to present this concept and discuss with the Troutdale City Council at a regular Council meeting in September. Robins Way Trail Restoration is Commencing

In June of 2019, a localized landslide occurred along Robins Way Trail on City-owned greenway property south of the Harlow House museum. The "debris fan" engulfed a segment of the trail but thankfully did not progress much further. The City of Troutdale's primary concerns in its initial response were the safety of the structure downslope, the safety of the roadway above the slope (SE Sandy Avenue), and the safety of trail users. Immediately after the slide occurred, the trail was closed and the City engaged the services of a Geotechnical Engineering specialist to conduct initial assessment and stabilization measures. The nearby structures and the road above were not found to be in danger and the initial stabilization measures appear to have been successful as the slide has not significantly progressed.

Following the initial stabilization measures, the City began undertaking efforts to restore the trail. Over the course of last winter and the first part of this summer, engineering plans

have been prepared by AKS Engineering and Forestry, and permits acquired, to clean up the slide, restore the trail to a usable condition, and install a trench to capture intermittent rock fall from the slope above as well as improve drainage. Bids for this construction work were opened on July 30th to favorable results, with Elk Mountain Incorporated of Sandy winning the award of the contract. Construction work is expected to be underway in September and is expected to complete in October, after which the trail will be reopened to the public.

On August 22nd, the Parks Advisory Committee held an outdoor Open House to obtain citizen input on bringing Pickleball to Lewellyn Park. We had 69 citizens attend and the community seems very supportive of converting one of the tennis courts. Making this happen sooner rather



than later was also a consistent suggestion from attendees. The adding of more recreational opportunities for the community has always been our goal. The popularity of the sport is huge nationally and is growing rapidly in the East County area. This appears to be an excellent and inexpensive opportunity for Troutdale to bring Pickleball to our community. Other options are currently being explored following the same concept of converting old and mostly unused tennis courts into Pickleball facilities. We'll keep you posted. Recycling and Solid Waste Rate Schedule Review

Waste Management (WM) has requested a solid waste rate review and analysis to determine if any adjustments to solid waste and recycling collection fees are warranted. That analysis is currently in progress. The Troutdale City Council will review proposed rate adjustments (if any) at a regular City Council meeting in September or October.

Sanitary Sewer Pretreatment Ordinance Update

The Oregon Department of Environmental Quality has advised the City of updates that are needed to the City's sanitary sewer pretreatment ordinances. Sanitary sewer pretreatment requirements apply primarily to commercial and industrial sewer discharges. The City of Troutdale City Council will review proposed updates to Troutdale's Municipal Code, Chapter 12.07, on September 8, 2020.

HAVE YOU BUILT YOUR HOME INVENTORY?

There's no better time to prepare for the future than right now We've all heard about "The Big One", the giant earthquake that we're told will swallow up, whole, the Pacific Northwest. And now, it seems we might get up close and personal with an asteroid sometime between now and election day. Sheesh!

While both these natural disasters would cause catastrophic damage, it's more likely we won't face either calamity in our lifetimes. But this might be a good time to begin preparing your 'Home Inventory'.

What's that? September is National Preparedness Month, and it begins with **Home Inventory Week.** To recognize this often overlooked part of disaster preparation, the Oregon Division of Financial Regulation encourages all Oregonians to do two simple tasks that will save time, money, and stress when disaster strikes:

Build a home inventory – Take video or photos of each room in your home, paying close attention to walls, drawers, closets, and storage areas. Recalling your personal property is a daunting task following a disaster. A home inventory eases the post-disaster stress, and enables your insurance company to move forward with processing your claim.

Review your insurance coverage – Take time to discuss your policies with your insurance company or agent. Make sure you have the right coverage and know what to expect when you file a claim for disasters such as fire, earthquake, flood, tornado, theft, and ice storms.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION

Years-long project will examine every inch of the city's storm and sewer systems



Sometime this year, or in the not too distant future, the citizens of Troutdale will notice a box van, parked, in their neighborhood. No need to worry, it's just the Water Pollution Control employees inspecting either the sanitary sewer or the

storm sewer. The City has purchased a Closed Circuit Television inspection vehicle to add to their fleet of service trucks.

The plan is to inspect the whole city, which could take several years to accomplish. There are approximately 57 miles of sanitary lines, 35 miles of storm lines, 1361 sanitary sewer manholes and 874 storm manholes that will need to be inspected and logged. By examining each line and joint and mapping each lateral or service connect, it gives us a better idea of the condition of the sewer systems. We can focus on our problem areas first and be more cost efficient for the future.

This cutting-edge technology uses a television camera mounted on a robotic device that is connected to a video monitor. Information is recorded onto a computer by a long electrical cable. The robotic system is placed directly into the sewer through a manhole. Once inside the sewer line, the device can be operated by remote control located inside the truck. The operator can examine the entire length of the line between manholes, and the camera's "pan and tilt" capabilities allow the operator to move the camera in all directions. If a defect is detected, the operator can note the exact location of problem spots and location of service laterals, giving us a better overall map of the whole system.

After extensive investigation and documentation of defects is completed, a rehabilitation plan will be developed, identifying necessary sewer repairs and/ or replacement. In severe situations, immediate repair may be required.


Disc Golf Flies into Troutdale

Reynolds School District Fall reopening information

In July, Governor Kate Brown announced that for schools to be allowed to reopen



to in-person instruction, the County where the school district is located must meet required COVID-19 case rate metrics. As of August 14th, Multnomah County had not met those metrics. Therefore, Reynolds School District has announced that it will begin the 2020-2021 school year in a **Comprehensive Distance Learning model.**

The official start date for the school year has been delayed giving teachers and staff additional time to prepare for Comprehensive Distance Learning. The first day of school will be Tuesday, September 15, 2020.

Each school within the District is currently working on an operational blueprint for a Hybrid Learning model for when Multnomah County meets the State and County metrics, which would allow the schools to open to in-person learning. City Services:


- All City buildings are open

NO UNLEASHED DOGS IN OUR CITY PARKS, SIDEWALKS OR STREETS

The City has received numerous calls over the summer from residents reporting unleashed dogs in numerous City parks, and all were accompanied by their owners. Please remember that **Sunrise Park is the only City** park that allows dogs, and they must be leashed at all times. Please show respect and care to your Troutdale neighbors, and keep your dog next to you while in a park or on a City sidewalk or street. Many adults are fearful of dogs running towards them, and rescue dogs or others that may behave reactively are also wary of being approached by a dog they're not familiar with.

WHEN WILL THE CITY SWEEP MY STREET?

City crews sweep city-owned streets ten times per year, keeping Troutdale beautiful, and cleaning the dirt and debris (and soon, leaves!) from roadways. Sweeping also helps keep our storm drains running clear, preventing flooding along streets and sidewalks.

Please move vehicles or other obstacles off the streets, allowing the sweeper to get next to the curb where most of the debris collects. During autumn, remember that Troutdale does not have a leaf pick-up program so please do not rake or blow leaves into the street.

2020 CENSUS DEADLINE IS NOW <u>SEPTEMBER 30</u>. COMPLETE YOURS TODAY!

On August 3, 2020, the U.S. Census Bureau reported that 93 million households, (nearly 63 percent of all households in the nation), have responded to the 2020 Census. This indicates that up to 4 out of 10 households have yet to be counted, and, with the new deadline, citizens have less than 30 days to respond.

If you haven't yet completed the Census, it's not too late – and your options to do so are simple and easy! Just go to https://2020census.gov/en.html, and select the method you prefer: online, by phone or by mail. The website will offer assistance with translation in over 59 languages, answer your frequently asked questions, and provide guides in Braille and large print. The results of the 2020 Census will help determine how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding flow into communities like ours, every year for the next decade.

EVICTION MORATORIUM EXTENDED TO SEPT. 30

If you are a tenant in **Oregon** and are unable to pay your rent, you cannot be evicted for nonpayment during the moratorium. Tenants will have a six-month repayment grace period, which lasts from Oct. 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021, to pay back rent from the moratorium period. IF YOU SEE PEOPLE NOT WEARING FACE COVERINGS

Currently, face coverings are required in Oregon for everyone age 5 and older, in all indoor public spaces and also outdoors when you cannot keep 6 feet from others. When you are out in the public, keep in mind some people can't wear a face covering due to a health condition, age or ability. Leave the area if you feel unsafe. Do not call 911. RIVER SAFETY MONUMENT PLANNED FOR GLENN OTTO PARK

(Note: Community Enhancement Program (CEP) grants are funded by a Metro imposed per-ton fee that is collected from solid-waste transfer stations and given back to communities with transfer stations within their city limits to help mitigate their impacts. Qualifying groups apply to receive grant funds for projects that rehabilitate or enhance the City of Troutdale.)

The American Medical Response (AMR) River Safety Team has patrolled Glenn Otto Park during the summer months for over 20 years. AMR Swiftwater Rescue technicians have provided water safety information,

identified and alerted swimmers and park visitors to potential hazards, and rescued swimmers in distress. AMR has recorded over 100 rescues and well over 1.000 assists over the last 20 years, and historical data during that time indicates that nearly 70 people would have drowned without AMR's River Safety Team intervention. Regrettably, they were not able to be at the park this summer due to COVID-19.

To celebrate and recognize these dedicated men and women, the Kiwanis Club of the Columbia Gorge has

commissioned Troutdale artist Chad Caswell to design a bronze life-size sculpture of an ethnically diverse male and female lifeguard watching over the Sandy River Bridge. It is anticipated the monument will be completed within two years.

To date, the Kiwanis Club has raised approximately \$80,000 through donations and grants. Please join them, along with AMR, the City of Troutdale, Chad Caswell and local business owners, in raising \$7,000 more to make this monument a reality. INTRODUCING CASCADIA ART ASSOCIATION

During the COVID shutdown, local artists were busy organizing a new non-profit organization called Cascadia Art Association (CAA). CAA's mission is to promote the performing, literary, and visual arts in our region. CAA's dream is to enrich our communities with concerts, dances, live performances, film, poetry, literature, color, shapes, images, and all things to capture our imagination. CAA is launching by promoting and participating in some existing projects:

- "Arts Destination": CAA will be working with local city governments and other organizations to make our area an Arts Destination.
- Fall Festival of the Arts: CAA is the new promoter of the Fall Festival of the Arts in Troutdale. Although the event was canceled in 2020, work has begun for the Festival, scheduled September 18-19, 2021.
- Community Enhancement Project (CEP): CAA hopes to develop a Public Art Master Plan for Troutdale. This will better enable Troutdale to diversify their public arts to include performing, literary, and visual art installations and community programs.
- **Community Art Trout Project**: In continuing support for Cracked Pots Reuse Art Show, CAA will continue with the "Paint the Trout" and "Best Dressed Trout Contest".
- Community Art Walks and events: CAA hopes to support and participate in local area art walks and events.
- Troutdale Art and History Tour Guide: The next phase of this guide will be to expand the map to include the entire Confluence Project from Fairview Grade School through Wood Village to Edgefield.

CAA is just beginning. Fall of 2020 will be its first membership drive. As membership builds, a small gallery will be available to member artists at CAA's office in the Troutdale Art Center. Eventually CAA would like to sponsor community art classes, art events, and conduct art tours.
