If you are a Troutdale resident who lives in a multifamily property without a WM statement, please bring your most recent utility bill or other piece of mail with your address as proof of Troutdale residency. If you are not a Troutdale resident or do not bring proof of residency, you will be charged accordingly. Items that do not meet WM's acceptable material criteria will not be accepted for drop-off.

Examples of Accepted Items:

Small Appliances – micro-wave, toaster, blender, air fryer etc. (not containing freon)

Large Appliances – washer, dryer, dishwasher, oven, range top, etc. (not containing freon)

Outdoor/Garage Items – Grills without charcoal or propane tank, scrap metal, windows, drained water heater (1), bicycles, exercise equipment, file cabinet

Household Items – Mattress, box spring, carpeting (with pad), furniture, sinks, toilets.



Not Accepted: Household garbage, animal waste, car batteries, engines, concrete, dirt, sod or stumps, food waste, household hazardous waste, liquids, paint, propane tanks, refrigerators (and other CFC/refrigerant containing items), rock, roofing materials, concrete, industrial waste, commercial waste, fluorescent fixtures.

What's Next? Update on the Sandy River Waterfront & Park Trail

We gave you an update last spring, (see May/June Champion) on what is happening with the Urban Renewal Area (URA). Since that last article several developments have occurred regarding the public park and trail along the river. Not only are the plans and funds available to start the waterfront park construction, Union Pacific Railroad has approved our 60% design plans that allow us to construct the trail under their bridge over the Sandy River. This is a critical connection from downtown, behind Depot Park, to the new park and commercial development. We are working hard to finish their approval process in the next few months. We are hopeful that sometime in 2024 we can start construction of the park and trail.

By 2025 you should be able to hike or bike on a paved trail from downtown Troutdale, all the way to Chinook Landing and beyond!

Along with our project, the Port of Portland is moving forward to build their trail that will connect with our Sandy River Trail. Work begins this fall building a paved trail from the I-84 bridge, north along the west side of the river.

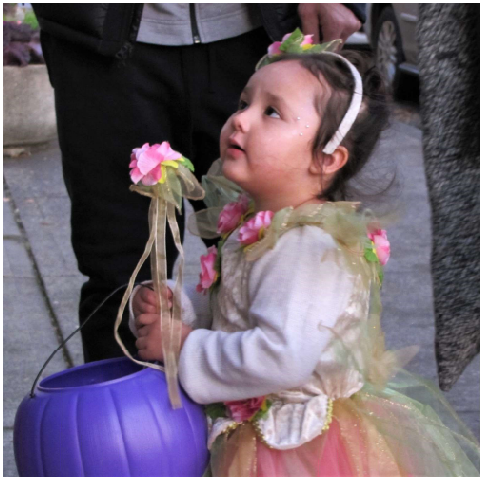

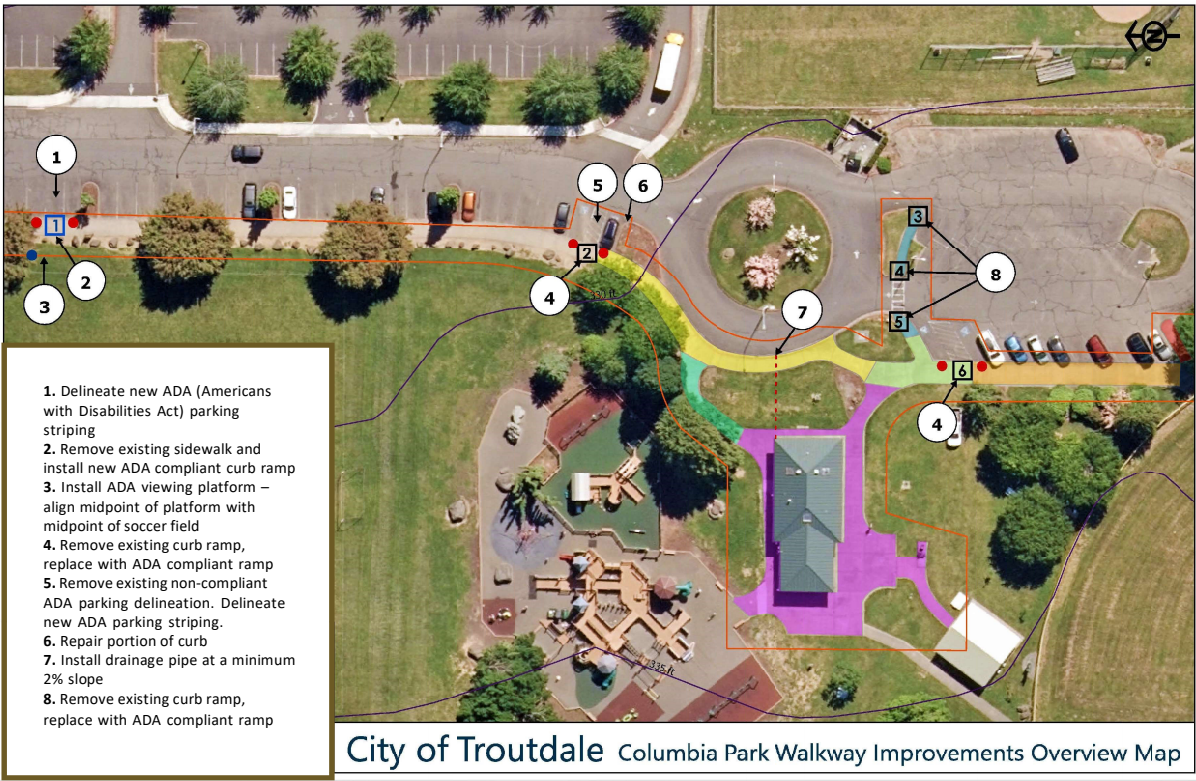
Upcoming Project:

Imagination Station Walkway Improvements

The City will soon be replacing walkways, parking, and ADA curb ramps in Columbia Park to improve accessibility and compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act. This project will be the first phase tackling a substantial portion of the walkways, especially around Imagination Station and the concession stands, with the remaining walkways to be budgeted for, and improved, in a future phase.

Columbia Park and access to the very popular Imagination Station

(which includes accessible play features), is a top priority in the City’s ADA transition plan, and these efforts are aimed at ensuring the walkways to the parking and curb ramps are accessible as well. The City will also be installing an ADA spectator pad located adjacent to the midpoint of the soccer field to provide those with mobility hindrances a comfortable spot to watch the action. This project will kick off in the fall just after the park’s busy season.

“My, those fall leaves sure look beautiful ...

...until they’re clogging storm drains and flooding roadways!” The City reminds residents to avoid raking or blowing fall leaves, grass clippings and other yard debris onto streets, as these items cannot be removed effectively by street sweepers. Accumulation of leaves on streets also endangers motorists and bike riders, whose tires may slip on leaves. Help keep our community healthy and livable for everyone by either keeping leaves onsite or responsibly collecting and disposing of leaves.

Leaves left onsite in a layer or in a pile to be later used as mulch can help make better soil, create food and shelter for insects, and potentially save time and money. The Troutdale wind will no doubt have its own say on where leaves stay put, but leaves help suppress weeds, retain moisture, and add organic matter to soil. Leaf cover also helps butterflies and moths over winter while providing great habitat for bumble bees, spiders, worms and others that in turn provide food to animals such as chipmunks and birds. According to the

Xerces Society, shredded leaves don’t provide the same cover as whole leaves and shredding may destroy caterpillars and chrysalis so no need to shred.

Waste Management collects leaves and other yard debris each week in residential yard-debris roll carts. You can set out your 60-gallon yard debris roll cart, one Kraft paper yard debris bag (no plastic bags, please), or one bundle (prunings limited to 4" diameter and 36" length) or yard trimmings every week for no extra charge. We encourage you to handle leaves in the following order::

- Keep leaves out of the street
- Use leaves on-site
- Put leaves in your yard debris bin
- Recycle Your Leaves - Leaves and other yard debris can be off-loaded nearby at:

Your efforts can help improve roadway safety, prevent flooding, create better soil and provide habitat to pollinators.

Multnomah County to add safety improvements on SW 257th Drive

Work slated to begin in 2024

Bike Boxes

Bike boxes will be installed at SW Sturges Drive/SW Cherry Park Road. A bike box is a designated area of green pavement markings at an intersection that provides cyclists with a safer and more visible way to stop and wait ahead of vehicles during a red light.

Bus stop improvements

Sidewalks will be widened next to bus stops and signs at those stops will be improved for clear visibility and access.

Enhanced Pedestrian Crossings

The County will install two new enhanced crossings in key locations along the corridor at SW 17th Way and SW 28th Street. These crossing enhancements include pedestrian-activated signals to stop traffic.

Signal Improvements

The County will install ADA-compliant accessible pedestrian signal push-buttons and upgraded pedestrian signal equipment.

Accessibility Improvements

The project will upgrade all sidewalk corners with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-compliant curb ramps.

In 2024, Multnomah County will be constructing several safety and accessibility improvements along SW 257th Drive that are aimed to improve safety for all users as well as reduce speeds. After extensive public outreach where the County asked the community to identify issues people face navigating SW 257th, the County selected these safety improvements based on those priorities and available funding.



The \$8 million project is designed to make it easier and safer for everyone to get around 257th Drive between SW Cherry Park Road / SW Struges Drive and SE Stark Street. Construction is expected to begin in 2024.

Lighting

Street lights will be replaced to improve visibility at night along SW 257th Drive for all users.

Traffic Calming

Radar feedback signs will be installed and the vehicle travel lanes will be narrowed. These changes can encourage drivers to slow down.

Buffered Bike Lanes

The County will narrow lanes for motorized vehicles to create more space for buffered bike lanes with new striping, from SW 16th Way to SE Stark Street. This will increase bike comfort and add extra space between cyclists and motor vehicles.

Repaving

The project will also resurface the existing pavement from the north side of SW 16th Way to SE Stark Street

Project Background

Located in Troutdale, SW 257th is one of the most heavily traveled Multnomah County roads, serving as a critical connection to I-84 and U.S. 26.

Troutdale Parks is partnering with The Trail Keepers of Oregon organization to make **improvements to the trail system in Beaver Creek Canyon** later this summer and early fall. The Trail Keepers will be holding a series of volunteer-

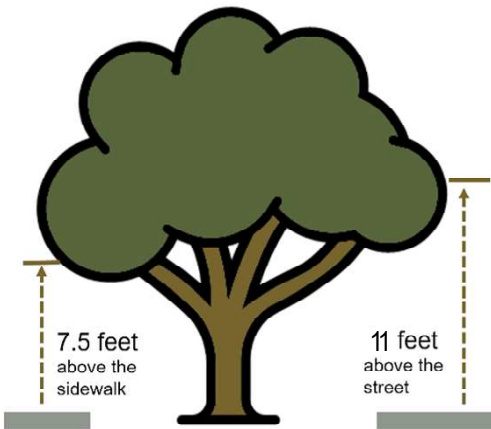

Property Owners are Responsible for Street Tree Maintenance Here’s what to know



The City of Troutdale needs your help to keep our streets clean and neighborhoods livable. As you may know, Troutdale’s streets are swept on a regular basis. Unfortunately, many tree limbs hang too low over the curb, thus forcing the sweeper operator to swerve away from the limb and the curb, which leaves debris behind. Troutdale’s Municipal Code assigns street **tree maintenance responsibility to the abutting property owner and requires that street**

trees be maintained at a height of 11 feet over the curb and 7½ feet over the sidewalk. This means that you should be able to drive an 11-foot-tall vehicle under tree limbs at the curb line, or walk down the sidewalk with your favorite 7½ foot-tall NBA star without him needing to duck below the limbs. Please do your part to trim the street trees adjacent to your property to these height requirements.

The City of Troutdale Partners with the Backyard Habitat Certification Program



The **Backyard Habitat Certification Program (BHCP)**, a collaboration between Columbia Land Trust and Portland Audubon, is excited to announce that the City of

Troutdale has become our latest funding partner! Beginning as a pilot project within a southwest Portland neighborhood in 2006, **the program has since enrolled over 11,300 participants** and expanded into four counties: Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, and Clark. While the first Troutdale resident enrolled in BHCP in late 2020, the recent financial support and partnership from the City will allow for more intentional growth within Troutdale in the upcoming years.

The goal of BHCP is to support community members in transforming their yards and greenspaces into climate-resilient habitats through sustainable and environmentally friendly gardening practices, within urban and suburban neighborhoods. Participants can enroll their residential yards, smaller than one acre, or community sites (e.g. schools, apartment complexes, places of worship, businesses, etc), of any size. They are guided in their efforts by individualized site reports compiled by Habitat Technicians who complete an in-person assessment of participants’ yards. Additionally, coupons and access to resources are provided to help them accomplish their rehabilitation goals focusing on five main elements: removing priority weeds, planting locally native plants, reducing pesticide use, supporting wildlife, and managing on-site stormwater. Taking these actions not only creates habitat and increases biodiversity within



urban spaces but may help cool neighborhoods, lower energy costs, reduce water bills, and positively impact mental health of community members.

Individual yards and community spaces join together to create wildlife corridors within the urban setting, exponentially increasing the impact of local parks and green spaces. Together we can support wildlife and mitigate the effects of climate change, one yard at a time. Water Safety on the Sandy River

While you are out enjoying the last of our nice warm weather, please know that **drowning is preventable!** When you go to cool off in a river or lake, always wear a life jacket. Life jackets are free to borrow through kiosks at popular parks and boat ramps, including Oxbow Regional Park, Dodge Park, Lewis and Clark Recreation Site, and Dabney State Park. No identification card is required! If Glenn Otto Park is your desired destination, please use EXTREME CAUTION and bring a life jacket with you, as the lifeguards and life jackets will no longer be present at this park after September 4th.

Backyard Fire Safety

The **mandatory burn ban for safety**, issued by the Multnomah County Fire Defense Board, **remains in effect in all areas of Multnomah County until further notice**. To check for any updates on the status of the burn ban, please call the East Multnomah County burn line at 503-618-3083. The burn ban includes all backyard burning, recreational fires, yard debris and agricultural burning, and permits issued for open burning until further notice. Residents should exercise extreme caution when cooking outside. Here are a few grilling safety tips:

- Place grill at least 10 feet away from your home or other structures. Grills that are placed too close to the house or other wood structures can heat up adjacent materials and cause a fire to start.
- Make sure that your grill is set up on a stable surface such as a concrete pad so that it remains level while cooking food.
- Check the gas lines to make sure that they are free of leaks before using your grill, and always open the lid of your barbecue before lighting.
- Never leave the grill unattended while you are cooking food. If you must leave the grill, ask another adult to watch the grill for you.
- Always have a fire extinguisher close by.
