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More Parking for the Historic Downtown

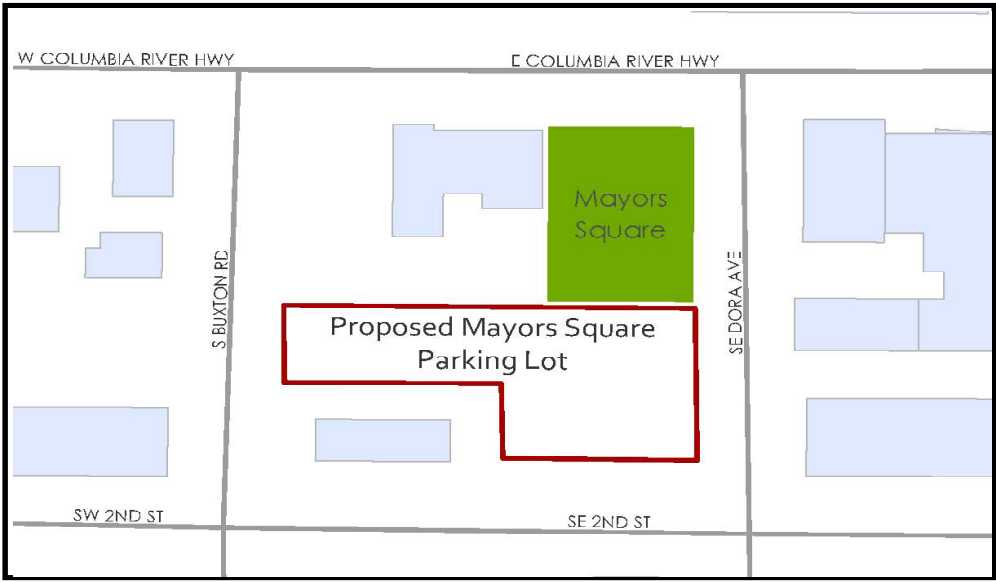
Fall project will pave 38 parking stalls plus bicycle parking

The Mayors Square Parking Lot site is located immediately south of Mayor's Square park in downtown Troutdale with entrances at SE Dora Street and SE Buxton Road. Since the demolition of the former Troutdale Police Department building at 141 SE Dora Avenue, the site has remained in a temporary use status as a public parking lot. The existing site is mostly gravel-surfaced and under-improved. This project will pave and construct full improvements to the site and make it a permanent public parking lot.

Firwood Design Group, a local engineering firm in downtown Troutdale, is performing the design of the project. The preliminary design provides 38 total head-in parking stalls, including three ADA parking spaces (the current gravel lot only allows parking for 20.25 cars). There will be two parking locations: 29 stalls in the main parking lot, including two ADA parking stalls;

and the remaining nine stalls as head-in parking on the north side of SE Second Street, including an additional ADA space. The lot will also include bicycle parking for up to 10 bikes. These counts may change slightly as the design is finalized, but a key goal of the project is to maximize added parking capacity to the City's central business district. Other improvements will include a retaining wall to create the head-in parking on 2nd Street, as well as drainage, stormwater treatment, lighting, pavement markings, and landscaping.

The construction of the project is expected to commence in early fall of this year, around the beginning of September, in order to avoid disruption of summertime parking. The estimated construction duration is two months. The project is currently proceeding through land use permitting with the City, with final design to proceed following the land use decision.

The City of Troutdale Community Enhancement Program (CEP) has an exciting opportunity for qualified groups to apply to receive grant funds for qualifying projects that rehabilitate or enhance the City of Troutdale. These grants are funded by a Metro imposed per-ton fee that is collected from solid-waste transfer stations and given back to communities with transfer stations within their city limits to help mitigate their impacts.

AMR lifeguards return to Glenn Otto Park May 27th

From Memorial Day through Labor Day, the American Medical Response (AMR) River Safety Program will provide two lifeguards at the Sandy River (Glenn Otto Park beach area) from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. AMR staffs the Park with a minimum of two guards per shift, and typically adds a third, and even fourth, when temperatures and/or crowds increase.

A reminder that the Sandy River is never safe

Glenn Otto Park poses serious dangers for swimmers and recreationists alike. With this year's full snowpack, the currents are strong and the river is icy cold, swift and unpredictable. Water levels and currents can fluctuate and change from day to day. Debris is a problem, both above and below the water.

Flotation devices are available on loan for free

Drownings are largely preventable if the swimmer is wearing a life jacket that fits properly. If you forgot to bring yours, there are free loaners available for daily use. AMR has approximately 75 to loan daily, in all sizes from infant to adults.

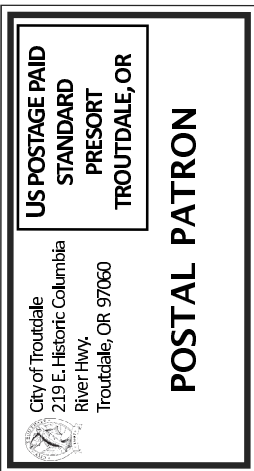


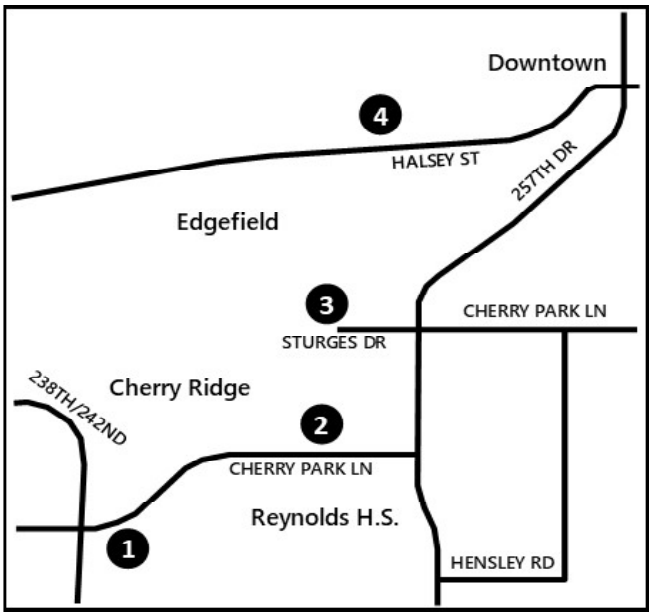
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FACT

During the summer of 2016, AMR lifeguards pulled 129 people out of the water at Glenn Otto Park - only seven were wearing a life jacket.

Pavement Preservation Begins Late Spring to Mid-Summer

This summer's Pavement Preservation projects are right around the corner. This is a 3-phase project: crack sealing, ADA improvements, and pavement overlays.

While sidewalks and crosswalks are closed for ADA work, please make sure your children know how to safely go around those small construction zones.

These preservation treatments extend the life of the asphalt and the long term and routine pavement maintenance is a much more cost-effective approach than allowing pavements to degrade to the point that they must be fully reconstructed. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) work will mostly occur

at crosswalks, and follows the National ADA Guidelines. During the construction of the ADA work, some sidewalks and crosswalks may be closed for up to several weeks. Please make sure that your children know how to safely go around those small construction zones.

Failing to pick up your pet's waste creates a human health issue for others, and also degrades water quality, both downstream and in the immediate vicinity.



A sunny spring day is a great time to head outdoors to finally stretch your legs along with Benji, Fido, or Sparky. What most pet owners are probably not considering during their jaunt is how many microbes and nutrients their pet may be depositing along the way. This is especially problematic in the spring and fall when rainy weather conditions make pet waste mobile, via rainwater, as the untreated waste flows into natural and manmade conveyance systems until it reaches our immediate waterways of Beaver Creek and the Sandy River. In 1991, the Environmental Protection Agency listed pet waste as a nonpoint source pollutant because of its potential impacts on waterways in urbanized areas. Failing to pick up your pet's waste not only creates a "yuck" factor and human health issue for others, it also degrades water quality, both downstream and in the immediate

vicinity. Beaver Creek has been identified by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality as having high levels of bacteria during low flow summer conditions. Nutrients in pet waste (and lawn fertilizers), namely nitrogen and phosphorous, also encourage excessive growth of weeds and algae in surface waters when the "food" and sunshine are plentiful. This excessive plant growth, combined with decaying pet waste that was transported via runoff, consequently uses more of the oxygen dissolved in water. During the summer months, warm water and less oxygen can be detrimental habitat conditions for fish and other aquatic life. Help protect our streams and our livability by disposing of your pet's waste in the garbage, flushing it down the toilet (cat litter must only go in the trash!), or burying it at certain soil depths.

WHAT'S BEING BUILT HERE?

1. Eagle Ridge Apartment Homes

- Location: Corner of 242nd Drive and Cherry Park Rd
- Project: 216 apartments (market rate)
- Completion: Fall 2019

This development will consist of nine apartment buildings and a commons building with a pool area. In addition to the property development, Cherry Park Road eastbound will be widened to add an auxiliary lane to help with current and future traffic flow at the intersection and into the apartment complex. The developer will also be building a civic square and entry feature right at the intersection.

2. Cherry Park Apartments

- Location: Off of Cherry Park Road, near Reynolds High School
- Project: 26-unit apartment complex
- Completion: 2020

These apartments will be oriented for families with multiple bedrooms in each unit and will be built in a townhouse style, though will not have actual units for sale. A commons area is included. Access to the property comes through another property's easement and will be improved.

3. Columbia Ridge

- Location: End of Sturges Avenue (access from 257th Drive)
- Project: 22-lot subdivision
- Completion: 2020

This subdivision will contain detached single-family homes for sale that are designed with traditional neighborhood design principles, including front porches and vehicle parking in the rear accessed through alleys. Improvements will be made to connect Sturges Lane with the Cherry Ridge subdivision for bicycle, pedestrian, and emergency vehicle access.

4. Kennedy Park

- Location: 1300 Block of Halsey St (north side of street, near Edgefield)
- Project: 60-lot subdivision
- Completion: 2020

This subdivision will contain townhouse style single-family homes for sale, with some of the lots containing accessory dwelling units. Parking for vehicles will be along a central street, with parking and driveway access taken from rear alleyways. Pedestrian and bus stop improvements on Halsey are also included in the project.

Don't be a Distracted Driver Eyes on the Road. Hands on the Wheel.

April was National Distracted Driver Awareness Month, and as we move into spring and wet weather conditions, the Sheriff's Office would like to encourage Troutdale residents to do their part to help keep our roads safe for all.

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), between 2012 and 2017, nearly 20,000 people died in crashes involving distracted drivers. There were 3,166 people killed in motor vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers in 2017. While this reflects a 9-percent decrease from 2016 to 2017, there is still much work to be done. In the last six years, 9.5 percent of all fatal crashes involved distracted drivers.*

Texting while driving has become an especially problematic

trend among younger drivers. In fact, in 2017, 8 percent of people killed in teen (15-19) driving crashes died when the teen drivers were distracted at the time of the crash. In fact, according to NHTSA, young drivers 16 to 24 years old have been observed using handheld electronic devices while driving at higher rates than older drivers since 2007.*

Oregon has also seen alarming numbers over the same period. Oregon Department of Transportation Department reports that from 2013-2017 there were 12,006 crashes resulting in 95 fatalities and 18,429 injuries caused by crashes involving distracted driving in Oregon (all ages). **

While law enforcement agencies were



out last month concentrating their enforcement efforts on distracted driving, the Sheriff's Office is asking drivers to put the phone down and consider the many other potential distractions in the car.

Distracted driving can take any form, from looking at something other than the road and changing the radio station to not having your hands on the steering wheel while moving down the road and trying to read your phone.

The Oregon Distracted Driving Law (also known as the cell phone law) now makes it illegal to drive while holding or using an electronic device, such as a cell phone, tablet, or laptop. Violators of the law can expect to face a maximum of \$1,000 fine upon a first offense that does not involve a traffic crash. Violators may also face a \$2,000 maximum fine for a second offense

or if the violation involves a traffic crash, and a maximum of a \$2,500 fine and 6 months in jail for a third offense in 10 years.

Please help to keep our community a safe and wonderful place to live, work and play.

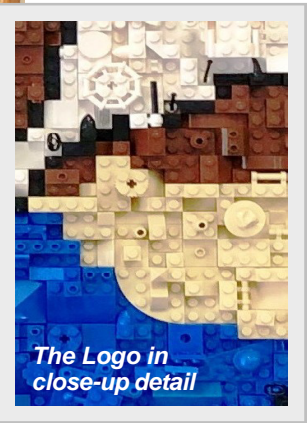

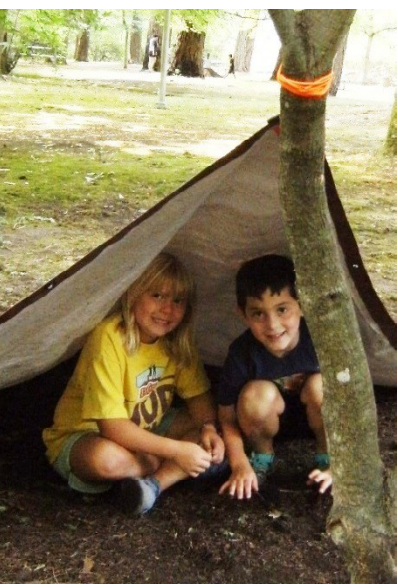
